In the past, aljamia played a significant role in preserving Islam and the Arabic language in the West.

By understanding the visual arts as a transliteration of one form of thinking to another, our workshop revisited the ongoing impact of Islamic art, science, and philosophy throughout the world today. Our collaboration included participants from Dubai, Kuwait, Doha, Afghanistan and Richmond.

Our collaboration produced a beautiful exhibition, an insightful panel, and a transcendent performance.



Days 1 – 3: Under Gower's guidance participants designed motifs based on Islamic tile patterns, which were used to create unique papercuts. Tessellation, mirror imaging, tiling, were used to create transitions. Our workshop partially blended with Schuld's workshop Re-Claiming the Wild Colors of Qatari Voices.

Day 4: Transliteration was explored through perspective. Under Benitez's guidance workshop participants transformed a traditional Islamic geometric motif into a perspectival drawing.

Day 5: The exhibition was installed and work continued on delicate wall tracings. First presentation of *Re-Claiming the Wild Colors of Qatari Voices* was performed by Jorge Benitez and Susan Schuld at the evening reception.

Day 7: The panel presentation included papers by Jorge Benitez, Khaled Saoud, and Jochen Sokoly. *Re-Claiming the Wild Colors of Qatari Voices* was presented a second time.









Gower (left to right) Papercuts: White/copper, Papercuts: White/emerald, Papercuts: White/cobalt (81" x 56" / each)










